

The year 2017 will always be a significant memory for me. My family and I were embraced by the loving congregation of First United. Being in ministry I have experienced what it is to reach out to people or families in their time of need to insure they feel supported by their church family. Last year the First United family reached out to me and my family through prayer, cards, food, visits, telephone calls, social media, and more prayers. God is good. During my sick leave the congregation didn't just manage but flourished with many people stepping up to take on larger roles and some volunteering for the first time. Deadlines were met, meetings happened, and the ministry continued. The worship life of the church never missed a beat. Leadership and preaching was powerful and compassionate. Outreach and Social Action Report February 2018

The Outreach and Social Action Committee was very active again this year keeping the congregation up to date on various activities of First United Church through our church communications, with our newsletters, the website (special thanks to Beulah Bouzane - BCI-Esolutions/Bouzane Consulting Inc.) and social media through Facebook and Constant Contact Email updates.

Bridges to Hope

- The first Sunday of each month is designated as Bridges to Hope Sunday at First United members of the congregation are invited to bring non perishable items. There are times throughout the year when extra help is needed to help stock the shelves and First United is always there to assist. Non-perishable food items are always needed and a collection bin is in the foyer of the church. Your continuous support is appreciated...thank you so much.
- At Easter and at Thanksgiving, we have "reverse offering" (special food drive) for Bridges to Hope.
- Newfoundland has the highest rate of per capita food bank usage in Canada. In 2014 the Bridges to Hope Food Pantry prepared hampers for over 8,800 people who needed food assistance and our clients come to us from every sector of society.
- No one is turned away. Clients access food assistance once a month and can receive a full food hamper or an emergency hamper. Loblaws discovered that Canadians have been over charged for packaged bread and have launched their \$25 gift card program for consumers. For those who are eligible, we invite you to pay it forward by donating your \$25 to Bridges. Bridges to Hope can use that \$25 toward groceries we need to purchase, and toward the homemade bread we bake for each and every hamper. #breadforbridges

White Gift – Sunday, December 3, 2017

The tradition of White Gift Sunday has its roots in a small Methodist church in Ohio in 1904. What began as a humble way to reflect on the love and devotion of the giver and not the value of the gift has grown into today's white gift services in many churches across several denominations. The story that is told is a minister's wife initiated the idea to solve the problem of inequity of gifts given at the Sunday school Christmas party. Instead of focusing on receiving gifts, the focus shifted to bringing gifts to Jesus that could in turn be shared with people around the world who did not have much. All the gifts would come wrapped in plain white paper, so that no one would know which was an expensive gift and which was a more modest one. No one would feel ashamed of their gift and everyone would share in the joy of giving to others. Today, in churches that observe White Gift Sunday, the service usually takes the form of a drama which

depicts some aspect of the Christmas story. In keeping with the spirit of the first White Gift service all those attending bring a gift wrapped in white paper to be given to someone in need. During White Gift Service our Sunday School children helped to collect the white gifts. After church they were sorted and distributed to those in need this Christmas at Bridges to Hope, Iris Kirby House and Emmanuel House... A special thank you to those who helped with this project.

Mission and Service Fund ~Minutes for Mission-

Each Sunday during our worship service you hear "*Minutes for Mission*" which is a story from a ministry supported by our gifts for Mission and Service. Each story is an invitation to pause and take a moment to connect with God's mission. Each story tells how we are living God's call to us to mend the world. Report to our Partner Churches for 2017

Bridges To Hope is a unique partnership of Presbyterian and United Churches operating a food pantry and other programs. Please visit our website, <u>http://www.bridgestohope.ca</u> and Facebook page, <u>https://www.facebook.com</u> to become more familiar with our services.

2017 was an important year for us as we made some significant changes in our operations. We also experienced continued demand of our services: daily food hampers increased by 6%; Christmas hampers increased by 8%; Bags To School also increased.

Vision

A community where each person has access to sufficient and wholesome food **Mission**

Inspired by values of dignity, respect and hospitality, Bridges to Hope supports people in need through direct food assistance, instructional cooking programs, and food security advocacy in metropolitan St. John's. Fundraising, food donation, volunteer participation, and a healthy workplace are essential elements in sustaining these activities. In association with the United and Presbyterian churches, Bridges to Hope is a non-profit society committed to accountable stewardship, good governance, open communication, and justice in all our relations.

Staff

Following the departure of our Executive Director in May the operations continued with the three continuing staff. This has required acceptance of changing roles and responsibilities. This adjustment is ongoing and the staff have responded well. We have also introduced a participatory medical benefits program.

Food Donations

Our food donations come from several sources: our church partners; corporate and school food drives; Community Food Sharing Association; purchases; baking on site. In 2017 we have improved our management of the flow of product from these various sources resulting in more efficient distribution at lower cost.

Marketing

We have launched an aggressive initiative to raise our profile and community awareness through use of social media, primarily Facebook. We invite everyone in your congregations to become a Friend on Facebook. And spread the word to all your regular friends! Please. We have already seen the tangible results of this profile in the community through increased traffic on Facebook, especially when people volunteer to push the Donate button which we conveniently provide on our website, using Canada Helps.

Finances

We depend on voluntary donations. In 2017, donations from our church partners increased almost 29% to \$18,560. This is our dependable core support and very much appreciated. Such an increase in support is simply wonderful! But it still represents less than 9% of our total revenue. We put a lot of attention and energy into fundraising initiatives. In September we held a fundraising event, which though modest in size, was quite successful. We plan to have a larger similar event in 2018. We are also seeking to encourage regular donations through our website. Those people who volunteer to become monthly donors are our Ambassadors. Already, in the last four months of 2017, our Ambassadors more than doubled and their monthly donations increased almost 50%. We believe this has much upside potential. There are many, many individuals and organizations who voluntarily choose to support us and what we do. We are humbled by your confidence and trust, and seek to be worthy.

New Pantry Facility

We continue to have dreams of a new pantry facility to cope with increases in clients, food storage, and hamper preparation, as well as necessary updating and improvements for the safety, security and conditions for our clients, volunteers and staff. We hope to fulfill this dream in 2018. More later.

- Assisted the Church Board with the preparation of the Take-Out Turkey Teas.
- During our regular meeting held the annual shower of personal care items to be given to Carew Lodge and Emmanuel House.
- Held our election of officers

December

- Conducted an evening memorial/celebratory service entitled 'Symbols of Christmas'
- Held the UCW Christmas Dinner and revealing of our Secret Sisters. We received a visit from Santa. The dinner was catered by the Men's Club. The evening was enjoyed by all.
- Delivered Christmas Gift Bags to the 14 men and 10 women at Carew Lodge.

The UCW continues to provide many programs with financial support. In 2017 the group supported the Mission & Service Fund, the Fellowship of the Least Coin, Burry Heights and the Chaplaincy Fund, as well as supported the church's local and building fund.

The UCW provides outreach in other ways. We provide copies of 'Our Daily Bread' booklets to members of the congregation; support Bridges to Hope with personal care items throughout the year; provide personal care items and other items to Carew Lodge and Emmanuel House at Christmas; provide hats, mittens and scarfs for the Mitten Tree Project. We have a prayer chain that circulates prayer requests for individuals and families who are going through difficult times. We provide the Baptismal Candles for newly baptized children and Birthday Cards for their 1st and 2nd Birthdays.

UCW members and friends knit strips for the Quilts for Comfort Project. Since this project started in 2006 a total of 533 quilts/blankets have been distributed far and wide to those who need a little warmth in their lives. This year we also gave Carew Lodge 11 quilts and one to a member of our congregation. We give thanks to those who have provided the wool, knit the strips and to those who put the quilts together.

The General Protestant Cemetery Trustee Board Inc. Annual Report for 2017

We continue to make improvements to our cemeteries each year. In addition to our regular maintenance at our cemeteries, we filled, leveled and re-sodded a large number of graves and leveled a number of headstones. As in previous years, we used several thousand square feet of sods again this year.

During the past year we had 226 burials, a decrease of 18 from the previous year; and of these, 149 (66%) were cremations.

Your Board met nine (9) times during the past year.

The **Memorial services** for this year well be held at Mt Pleasant Cemetery, Monday, July 2nd, 2018, 7pm. and General Protestant Cemetery on Monday, July 16th. 2018, 7 pm.

General Protestant Cemetery, Old Topsail Rd. / Waterford Bridge Rd, St. John's. As indicated in the above chart, we still continue to have a small number of interments / inurnments in this cemetery. The first burial took place in 1842. Since there are no new plots available, all of these interments / inurnments were in previously purchased plots or in existing family plots. This year we've spent a substantial amount of time removing fallen trees and leveling / resodding sunken graves.

The annual Memorial Service took place on July 17, 2017. There was a small number of attendees. However, everything went well, and the offering was up slightly from last year. Thank you to all those who helped.

Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Hamilton Avenue Extension / James Lane, St. John's. The first burial took place in 1942. The majority of all interments / inurnments continue to take place in this cemetery, mostly in previously purchased plots or existing family plots. Currently, there are only a few single plots available and there are NO double plots available. We have approximately 45 niches available in the Columbarium's. Each niche is large enough for two (2) urns.

The annual Memorial Service took place on July 3rd, 2017. Everything went well, the weather was good and the attendance was very good. However, the offering was down from last year. Thank you to all those who helped.

Memorial Gardens, Galway, St John's.

The first burial took place on September 1st, 2015. There have been eighteen (18) burials up to our year end date of October 31, 2017. Since there's just a small number of plots remaining in Mt. Pleasant, we expect that in the near future the number of interments to increase substantially in Memorial Gardens.

We experienced some problems with access to Memorial Gardens last fall during construction of the round-a-bout at the entrance from Ruth Avenue. However, this work is basically complete and we do not anticipate any problems in the future.

We have completed work on a new Field of Honour in Memorial Gardens, and it's now ready for burials.

Approximately 260 ft. of concrete base has been installed for regular headstones and 70ft. for Field of Honor headstones. This will ensure that all headstones will remain straight and level and will reduce any maintenance on them in the future.

This year we plan on extending the chain link fence around the cleared area, and also we plan to have an area of paving completed.

As a point of interest for those who are wondering about the size of Memorial Gardens. The overall size is 35 acres and to date 10 acres have been cleared and basically ready for use. In comparison, Mt. Pleasant is 17 acres. The west boundary is adjacent to the new water tower that is installed for Galway. So needless to say this new cemetery will provide burial space for many future generations.

A personal thank you to the congregation of First United for their continual support.

I am pleased to place on record a special thank you to our cemetery staff. We have a dedicated staff, and the feedback from the public is excellent. We appreciate the work done by Bill, Vince and Graham, and 3-4 seasonal workers. We operate six days a week, sometimes through difficult and challenging situations, especially during the winter season.
